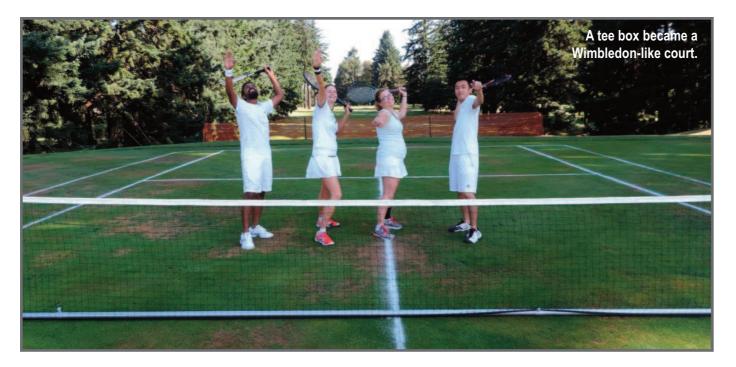


Community Programs Take Center Stage at Glendoveer Golf and Tennis

ful holiday event.

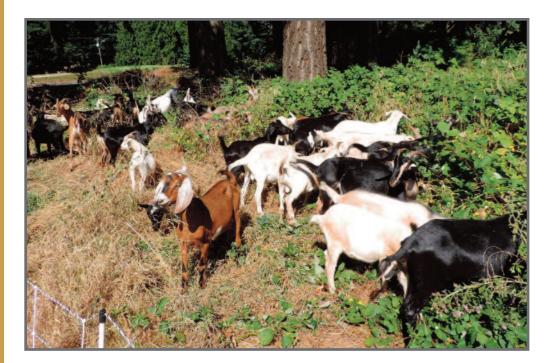
The tennis courts were transformed into a Haunted Forest to give them a safe place to do their trick or treating this year.

One of the largest projects completed was the construction of a new, solar powered cart barn. Working with the Energy Trust of Oregon, Glendoveer invested heavily into this new facility designed to harness solar energy to power its fleet of electric carts.

All of the paint used in construction, as well as used throughout the course, is recycled Metro Paint. Along with investing in environmentally friendly technologies, Glendoveer is also looking at other methods to increase environmental sustainability.
